Great start to 2022 for Arapaoa Kiwi Trust

In a project this size, it seems everything takes so long. It takes a lot of work to apply for funding and funding decisions can take months. Since the last newsletter, we have received funding from Rata Foundation to help fund our administration and operational costs and we have received some funding from Lions Foundation to start our community trapping stage. A big thank you to both organisations.

With the community trapping, we will be placing traps with residents on the island and mainland - mainly near the shore and around buildings - easily accessible to the residents. They will need checking every week or three and reporting back to us. If you would like a trap or two, please contact admin@arapaoakiwi.org.nz. We have placed the order for the traps, but unfortunately won't be receiving them until June or July. We will also be applying for more funding for more community traps.

We have also applied for funding for our pilot stage - 12km of trap lines around two properties in East Bay. This will allow us to get all our systems in place for managing large numbers of traps and monitoring, as well as making sure our traps and methodology are suited to the island. Hopefully, we will have the pilot in place before spring, ready for the peak season for trapping stoats.

I had been planning on discussing dogs and kiwi in this newsletter. But I have put my priorities these last months on applying for funding and getting the operational plan complete. I will write about this topic in a future newsletter.

The Project



Arapaoa Kiwi is aiming to eradicate stoats from Arapaoa Island and reintroduce kiwi to the island in the next 5-7 years. We will be aiming for a trap every 5-7ha, so around 1500 traps will be required. This will involve installing trap lines on most ridges, formed tracks, near streams and beaches and around various features that attract stoats. Once the stoats are eradicated, trapping will continue, as we will get continual reinvasion with stoats. We are intending to also trap the mainland near the island to reduce the population there, which should reduce the pressure for stoats to swim across.

The many existing species of birds including Falcons, Bellbirds and Tui will also

appreciate the eradication of stoats. Hopefully, kaka, kakariki and other bird species will re-introduce themselves.

The Arapaoa Kiwi project is inspired by the Capital Kiwi project in Wellington, which has been underway for the last 4 years, eradicating stoats from the 23000ha of land west of Wellington. They are about to introduce kiwi. See www.capitalkiwi.org.nz

Importance of Property Access:

To eliminate stoats from the island, we need to trap all the larger properties on the island. Gaining access to these properties is critical to the project. If we cannot trap one property, there will be stoats there that will continue to breed, defeating all the work elsewhere on the island.

The funding organisations are very aware of the issue, and often it is a condition of funding that written property access consents are attached to the funding application. So this year our major effort will be gathering all the access consents.

We are very aware that property owners have often chosen to live on the island to get away from everyone, and they don't want strangers wandering all over their land. So to help alleviate this concern, we will:

- Consider it a privilege to have access to this property, and not abuse this privilege
- Respect the owner and their rights
- Only access this property for trapping, monitoring, maintenance operations and for no other purpose including hunting or walking
- Only access tracks and trap lines agreed with the owner/agent
- Only trap and/or kill stoats and rodents no goats, pigs, deer or other animals
- Advise the owner/agent by email at least 1 week prior to access. No access outside of the agreed timeframe
- Get permission from the owner/agent prior to any major track maintenance or cutting new access tracks or accessing non tracked areas or cutting / felling any trees or shrubs or using any machinery.

- Not carry any firearms of any type (including bows) or bring any dogs on to this property
- Provide regular updates and newsletters as to the project progress and numbers of animals trapped on owner's land.
- Maintain and observe a comprehensive health and safety policy
- Hold public liability insurance

As well as this, we will endeavour to employ locals for the trapping. We will not be using volunteers on private property, without permission.

With the introduction of kiwi, there will be no restrictions on the property owner on how they can use their land. We will be introducing a dog policy, but it won't in any way restrict dog ownership or use. We will not be banning dogs (or cats).

As mentioned before, access is critical for this project, and if the owner is still concerned, there are other options available and we may still be able to come to a mutually acceptable solution so the property is still trapped.
